TUESDAY, JULY 23

DAY 1, SAIL TO PAKLENI ISLANDS

Over six miles long, this group of islets represents one of the biggest attractions in Croatia. Taking its name from 'Paklina', a resin once used to coat ships, the Pakleni Islands offer small, secluded beaches, deserted coves and sun-drenched hills. The biggest island, Sveti Klement, offers a modern marina and incredible restaurants. Pakleni otoci translates to Hellish Islands in Croatian. However, this place is rather heavenly. We suggest visiting Palmizana bay for amazing restaurants and lounges, and Tarsce bay for snorkeling. Overnight on Pakleni islands.

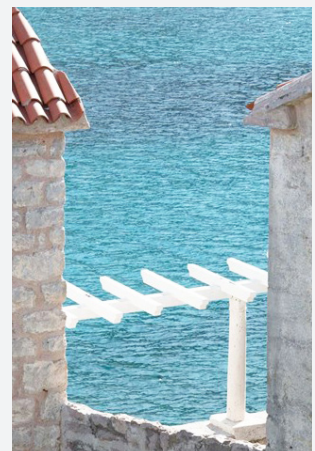
DAY 2, SAIL TO KORCULA ISLAND

One of the most popular travel destinations on Croatia's South Dalmatian coast, the island of Korcula is also one of the greenest. Its dark, dense pine forests inspired the Ancient Cnidian Greeks to name it Melaina Korkyra (Black Corfu or Corcyra, as their homeland region was once known), when they settled there in 6 BC. Today, the lush pine forests remain as one of the main features of the hilly Adriatic island, especially along its north facing slopes, scattered with dry stone walls enfolding vineyards and olive groves; still cultivated as a livelihood by inland settlements today. In fact, two of the most popular Croatian white wines, Posip and Grk are grown on the island. The islanders from seaside towns and villages live mainly from fishing and tourism, as the rocky, indented coastline offers numerous secluded pebble beaches and bays, breathtaking hilltop views, including sixteen islets, which can be explored by boat. The island has much to offer in terms of history, culture and of course, natural beauty, with the bonus of having a more relaxed and authentic ambience. Overnight in Korcula.

THURSDAY, JULY 25

DAY 3, SAIL TO MLJET

Mljet is the first larger island one come upon while sailing the Croatian Adriatic from the direction from south to north. It is Croatia's greenest island with its Mediterranean vegetation, clear and clean sea, gentle sandy shoreline and a wealth of underwater sea life. The island is considered to be one of the most beautiful of the Islands too. Mljet is well known for its white and red wine, olives and goat's cheese. It is indeed an unspoiled island covered by a dense Mediterranean forest. The sea around here is rich in fish and marine life. Overnight in Mljet.



FRIDAY, JULY 26–SATURDAY, JULY 27

DAY 4 & 5, SAIL TO DUBROVNIK THROUGH ELAFITI ISLANDS

Situated to the north-west of Dubrovnik, this group of islands is made up of thirteen islands, the majority of which are uninhabited. You will have the opportunity to visit three of them—Koločep, Šipan and Lopud. Take a dip in the crystal-clear seas, stroll in the shade of Mediterranean vegetation, explore quaint hamlets or simply indulge your taste buds with local cuisines, the choice is yours. It's a perfect place to get away from the hustle and bustle of life as there are no cars, in fact, no vehicles at all. Disembark the yacht.

Private guided city tour of Dubrovnik old town with city walls

Meet your private guide upon arrival in old town from where you will start your Dubrovnik experience. The city of Dubrovnik, once the center of the Dubrovnik Republic which, for a time, competed on equal ground with Venice in the North, is today one of the most important historic centers on the Adriatic, as well as the Mediterranean. By far the best way to experience the vast cultural and historical heritage of Dubrovnik, is to traverse its streets on foot. A stroll over the famous Stradun, and the 25m high, 2km long City walls, will take you past numerous palaces, churches, and various places whose lesser significance all adds up to the vast glory of Dubrovnik. Its name is somewhat of a synonym for Croatia in the far corners of the world, and the more you learn of Dubrovnik, the less surprised you will be to know that its population increases tenfold during the peak of the tourist season. Entering the old town through the Gothic arch of the Pile Gate is like traveling back in time to the city's celebrated Renaissance past, with an assortment of exquisite historical landmarks at every turn. This is all the more remarkable considering the suffering inflicted on the city's architecture during the conflict of the early nineties. Sites to see include the imposing Dominican Monastery, the striking and impressive Rector's Palace and the sumptuous Baroque Church of Saint Blaise, No visit would be complete without a tour of the magnificent city walls, rewarding you with staggering views over the rooftops and glittering waters of this city.

Wine tasting in Virpazar

Enjoy a warm welcome from the wine-making family here, and sample their Vranac Barrique red wine, produced from a grape that has been grown for centuries in the region.

Cetinje, Lovcen National Park and Njegos's Mausoleum

Explore Montenegro's history on a walk through the old royal capital, Cetinje, and its museums. Continue to Lovcen National Park nearby, an area dominated by the Jezerski Vrh peak and the 19th-century mausoleum of Petar II Petrovic Njegos—a poet, philosopher, prince-bishop and statesman.

Kotor and Perast

A Unesco World Heritage Site, Kotor is situated in the southern part of the Bay of Kotor, the Adriatic Fjord. Rich in cultural heritage, the town is easily combined with a tour of Perast, featuring some of the best examples of Baroque architecture in the Mediterranean.
